

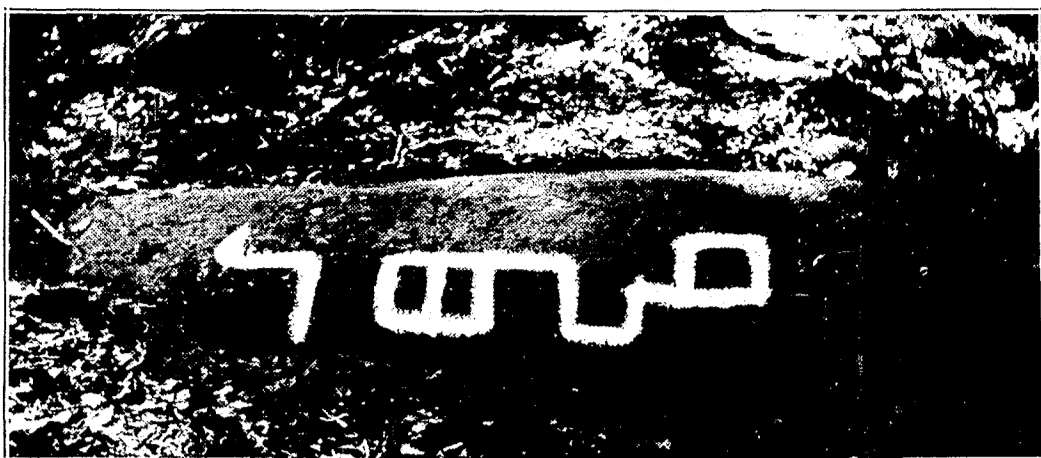

4 More Die, Bringing Total Attributed to Drug to 13

By The Associated Press CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—Dr. Morris Fishbein, editor of "The Journal of the American Medical Association," said tonight laboratory experiments made it "quite evident the diethylene glycol, not the sulfanilamide" of an "elixir of sulfanilamide" was responsible for the deaths of thirteen persons using the solution.

In Washington, chemists of the National Institute of Health said they felt "positive" sulfanilamide itself had not caused any deaths. Sulfanilamide is used in the treatment of kidney and streptococcal infections, meningitis and gonorrhea. The medical association warned the public against using the "elixir" which was distributed throughout the country. The producing company has recalled its shipments.

Melville Untermyer, Cousin of Poet, Was Under Care of Doctor Recently Retired Five Years Ago

Was Associated in Jewelry Companies Until Then

By The Associated Press MELVILLE Untermyer, retired jewelry manufacturer, cousin of Louis Untermyer, the poet, was killed about 5:15 p. m. yesterday in a plunge from a window of his apartment on the tenth floor of 895 Fifth Avenue between Eleventh and Eighty-first Streets.

Delivies of the East Sixty-seventh Street station, who investigated Mr. Untermyer's death, reported that he "jumped or fell," and added that they had found no evidence indicating suicide—neither a note nor any suggestion that he deliberately had leaped.

Washington chemists reported sulfanilamide is almost insoluble, only 1 per cent being dissolved when it is placed in water. They also said that it is a close relative of the chemical ethylene glycol, which is used as a radiator anti-freeze in automobiles and airplanes.

Three Others Ill in Illinois ST. LOUIS, Oct. 19.—Four East St. Louis, Ill., Negroes have died in the last four days. Three others are seriously ill, following treatment with a proprietary elixir of sulfanilamide, a new drug preparation, the office of A. E. Lowe of the Federal Food and Drug Administration disclosed today.

ON THE RECORD

WHATEVER the unprecedented stock market break proves or does not prove, one fact stands out gloriously. There is, at this moment, a complete breakdown of the government regulatory system which we have been asked to presume existed, and which was to save us from just this sort of thing.

For the first time in our entire history securities have suffered an interrupted decline for two months, with a fall of 67 per cent in 100 major stocks. In this decline, the small stockholder, the middle class of the country, has suffered unprecedentedly.

One thing is certain: This is no time to call names. The country is less interested, at the moment, about who is to blame than about what is to be done. If the feeling of hatred and hostility, of exaggerated lack of confidence on both sides were diminished, that of itself, would ease the crisis.

In 1933 President Roosevelt demonstrated what could be done by an appeal to the best instincts of everybody, by an appeal to a constructive social spirit. I wish he would get out his own early speeches and read them to the men in Wall Street—its a gamblers' world, anyhow. It is impossible to believe anything so wild. Obviously the market does not exist in a vacuum.
